I. CASE STATISTICS:

- a. PARC reviewed 36 cases involving 42 officers.
- b. Breakdown Citizen v. Internally Generated Complaints
 - i. 26 Citizen Generated Complaints
 - 1. In 9 of the cases generated by a citizen complaint, COC found at least one violation of policy by one officer.
 - 2. In 10 of the cases generated by a citizen complaint, PARC found at least one violation of policy by one officer.
 - ii. 10 Internally Generated Complaints
 - 1. In 8 of the cases generated internally, COC found at least one violation of policy by one officer.
 - 2. In 6 of the cases generated internally, PARC found at least one violation of policy by one officer.
- c. CPD Chain of Command found 22 violations of policy among the 36 cases
- d. PARC found 19 violations of policy among the 36 cases.
- e. Chief Results: For all cases considered by PARC since October 2020, the Chief has issued results in 36 of the 73 total cases heard. The Chief's decision differed from the PARC decision in 4 of those 36 results (Note: in 4 other cases the officer resigned prior to a result being made by the Chief and those cases were administratively closed).
